

In our R.E topic "What is the Trinity?" we will be finding out how Christians










































Homework:





Most of your child's reading in school is through whole class reading, so it is really important to listen to your child read at home as often as possible, aiming for a minimum of four times a week for 10 minutes. Reading records are checked every Monday and your child can change their book on a Monday if required.

Spelling Shed

The spelling shed games can really help your child to learn the spelling pattern

each week, and also challenge them to extend their vocabulary by

additional words that have the same pattern. Your child's password and user name is inside their reading record. The spellings that will be in the test on Friday are the ones we select to be the most useful to help them in their writing. We also include 3 spellings from the Year 3/4 Statutory Spelling List.

Times Tables

It is important that Year 4 children learn all of their tables up to 12X12 by the end of the year. We are trialling using a sound pattern to learn our timestables. Please see below for extra information about how we are learning our timetables in year 4 and some helpful tips you can try at home. Little and often throughout the day is our moto, so you may often hear us chanting our tables as we leave at the end of the day. To help consolidate this work, please use Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS) at home as often as possible, as this is a great way for the children to practise their tables at speed.

Principles

1. Learn as a memorised phrase by repeating sound pattern out loud. Don't try to derive. If you don't know - copy down then learn later.

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- 2. Learn each fact one way round only, then get confident at switching factors.
- 3. Don't think! (about the only time in maths when thinking is unhelpful!) When trying to recall a fact, say the WHOLE number sentence out loud and see if the answer trips off your tongue.

Always say the largest number first, e.g for $8 \times 4 & 4 \times 8$ say: Eight fours are 32

How many eights are in 32. 32 divided by 8 is 4

4. Learn one new fact at a time. Don't try to learn the whole times table at once.
